Nora gradually awakens from a housewife who is dependent on her husband and blindly obedient to a woman who pursues independence and self-worth. In this process, the contradictions, struggles and growth she experienced were not only an exploration of personal destiny, but also a profound revelation of the deep desire for freedom, equality and dignity in human nature.

In dramatic characterization, assumptions and authenticity are not isolated aesthetic qualities, but interdependent and interactive. One promising area for further research involves a more detailed investigation into how actors' performance skills directly contribute to the formation of aesthetic tension. While the present study emphasizes the significance of balancing assumptions and authenticity, future research could examine how specific acting methodologies influence this balance. For instance, comparative analyses of acting systems—such as Stanislavski's emotional realism and Brecht's alienation effect—could reveal how different techniques either heighten or reduce aesthetic tension. Additionally, longitudinal studies observing actors' interpretative processes during rehearsals may offer valuable insights into how performers navigate the dynamic interplay between fictional assumptions and emotional authenticity over time.

Moreover, future research could explore the role of actors' emotional memory and physical embodiment in creating authentic yet imaginative performances. Investigating how actors integrate personal experiences with their interpretative choices may clarify how deeply internalized emotions can enhance or disrupt the balance between the imaginative framework and realistic portrayal. By focusing on these practical aspects of performance, researchers could provide more nuanced explanations for how actors cultivate and sustain aesthetic tension in live theatre.

2. Expanding Research on Innovative Theatre Techniques

As theatre continues to evolve in response to technological advancements, another critical area for future research lies in exploring how innovative forms of theatrical expression impact the relationship between assumptions and authenticity. Given the central role of actors' performance skills in maintaining aesthetic tension, future research should also focus on enhancing theatre education and training. It is essential to develop comprehensive training models that equip actors with the interpretative and technical skills necessary to navigate the complex relationship between assumptions and authenticity. One potential avenue for research is the design and evaluation of specialized workshops that emphasize the practical application of these concepts. Such programs could focus on developing actors' capacity to interpret scripts with greater depth while maintaining a dynamic and emotionally resonant stage presence.

Furthermore, interdisciplinary collaboration between theatre practitioners and scholars from fields such as psychology and media studies could enrich training methodologies. For example, incorporating insights from cognitive science on emotion and perception might help actors refine their ability to evoke authentic responses while working within fictional frameworks. Research in this area could also investigate how training programs can adapt to new performance environments that integrate digital and immersive technologies. Strengthening theatre education in these ways would not only enhance the artistic cultivation of actors but also contribute to the broader development of theatrical artistry and innovation.

4. Broadening the Scope of Comparative Analysis

Another important direction for future research is the comparative analysis of aesthetic tension across different cultural and theatrical traditions. By examining how various cultural contexts interpret and manage the interplay between assumptions and authenticity, researchers can gain a more global perspective on the formation of aesthetic tension. Comparative studies could investigate how cultural values influence actors' approaches to performance and how these variations affect audience engagement and emotional responses.

Additionally, future research could explore how aesthetic tension functions across diverse theatrical genres, such as tragedy, comedy, and physical theatre. Different genres may require distinct balances between imaginative assumptions and emotional authenticity, and studying these variations could reveal new dimensions of how aesthetic tension operates in performance. Such research would enhance the theoretical framework of aesthetic tension while offering practical knowledge for contemporary theatre-makers.
